AIMS students recently completed the Northwest Evaluation Association Measurement of Academic Progress (NWEA-MAP). This is the standardized test that has replaced the Iowa Test of Basic Skills (IOWA). MAP testing is done electronically and results are returned promptly. The tests are appropriate for students of all nationalities and the designers have eliminated cultural bias. So far, we are pleased with the format, areas of testing and the technical and directional support. Teachers are learning how to effectively use the testing results to guide instruction. Student results will be discussed with you at our PTC meeting on February 5, 2012. We encourage all of our parents to attend.


Parents and teachers get acquainted for goodwill and the betterment of AIMS students

AIMS parents and teachers help flood victims

I was born in Ayutthaya province. I have never seen a horrible flood situation in my whole life than the one that happened in my hometown Ayutthaya. I could feel for the people there who suffered the calamity that befell them.

I felt so concerned about my townspeople in Bang, Pra-in, Ayutthaya that I wanted to help them as much as I could. Because of the floods, people there needed much food, water, more clothes, shelter, and everything so they would survive.

To be able to help, some AIMS parents and teachers donated money to buy goods for the flood victims. With the money collected, we were

able to buy 560 packs of cooked foods and 100 packs bottled water. With the same money, we also bought 150 kilograms of rice, 11 dozens of noodles, 11 dozens of bottled oil, 50 kilograms of sugar, 45 kilograms of chicken, 11 dozens of packed salt, soy sauce and coffee.

On October 11, we distributed the 560 packs of cooked food to the people of Bang Pra-in, Ayutthaya, and another 162 packs of goods consisting rice, noodles, oil, sugar, chicken, salt, soy sauce, and coffee to the residents of Nakorn, Laung, also in Ayutthaya.

Khun Kitty, Pi Somporn, Teachers Wirun and

Belle, Khun Omika "Aoe", and Ruamkatunyoo Foundation donated money and helped packed the 560 and 162 packs of goods that were distributed to the people.
