AIMS High School Trip to Khao Kheow Zoo

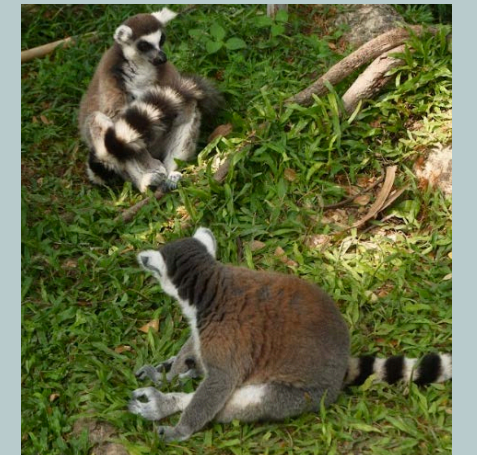
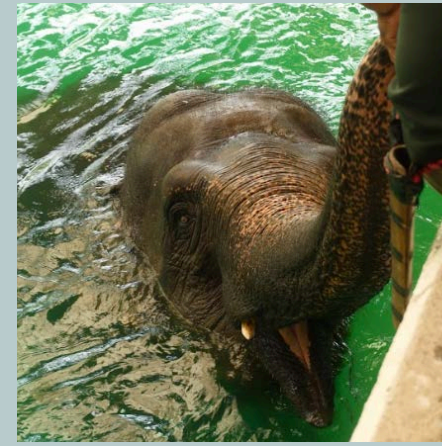

Since of March 20-21, the AIMS Highschool are again out and about, notably in an overnight trip to Khao Kheow Zoo in Chonburi.

Home to more than 8,000 animals, including rare species and breathtaking exhibitions, this expansive wildlife sanctuary is situated just outside of Pattaya. The excursion promised an amazing learning experience in addition to a thrilling day of animal exploration. In addition to learning how conservation efforts help preserve these amazing species, students got a close-up look at exotic animals including tigers, giraffes, and elephants. The students more than a fun time as they immersed themselves in breathtaking wildlife not found commonly here in Thailand.

The ideal location to make textbooks come to life is Khao Kheow Zoo, which offers engaging exhibits, informative lectures, and practical experiences.

After a long exhausting day of travel and exploring, the high school were able to get to their accommodations with no problems. Even after the tumultuous activities, the students still had enough energy to use up during the evening activities via board games, social night, photo taking and many more.



The students did a lot of hands on activities, such as feeding the animals and watching the animals up close. The famous pygmy hippo, Moo Deng, was found that this zoo and everyone flocked to see her. There were multiple animals with names such as Mew, the white lioness, and Labubu, the stripe tailed lemur.

As a student at AIMS, I was thrilled to go on a two-day field trip to Khao Kheow Open Zoo in Chon Buri.



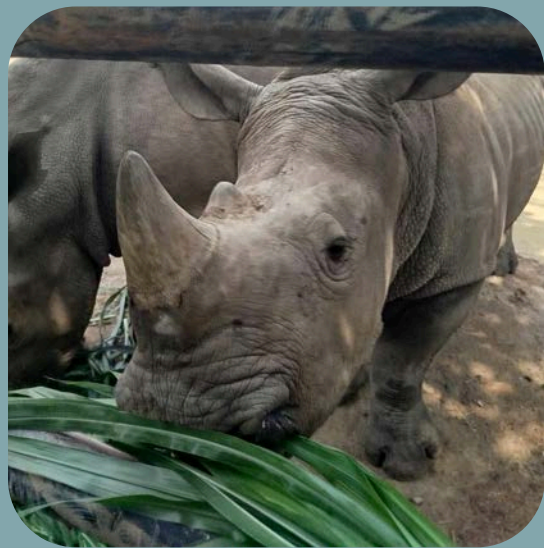

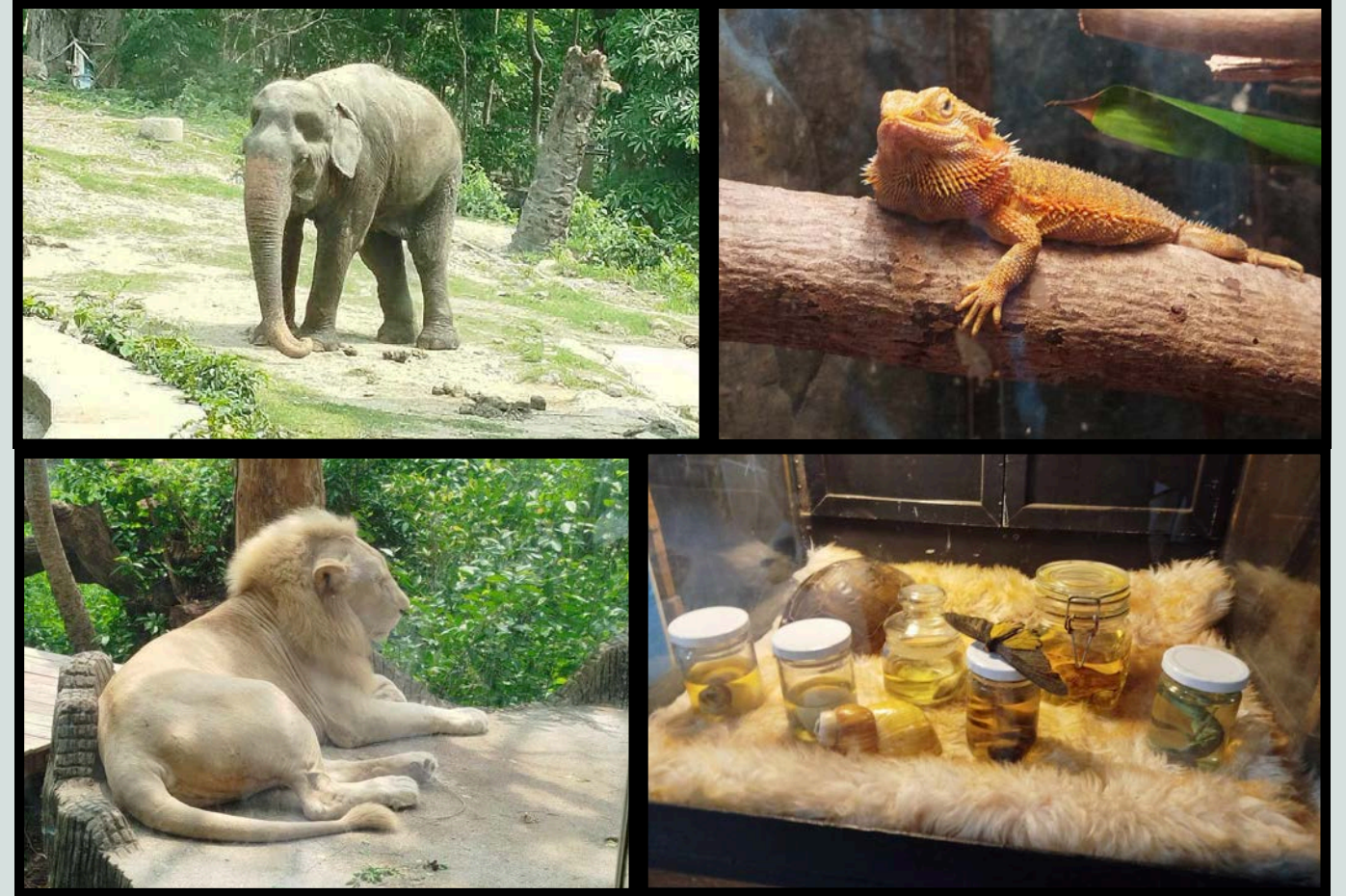

Days Among Wildlife

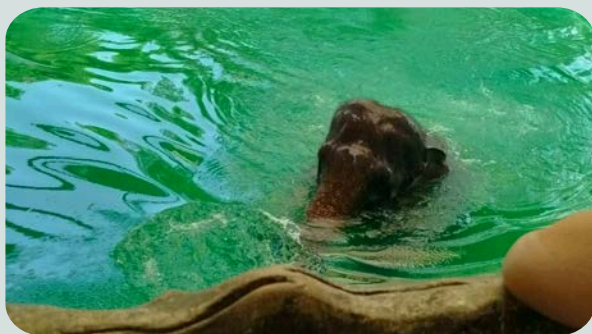

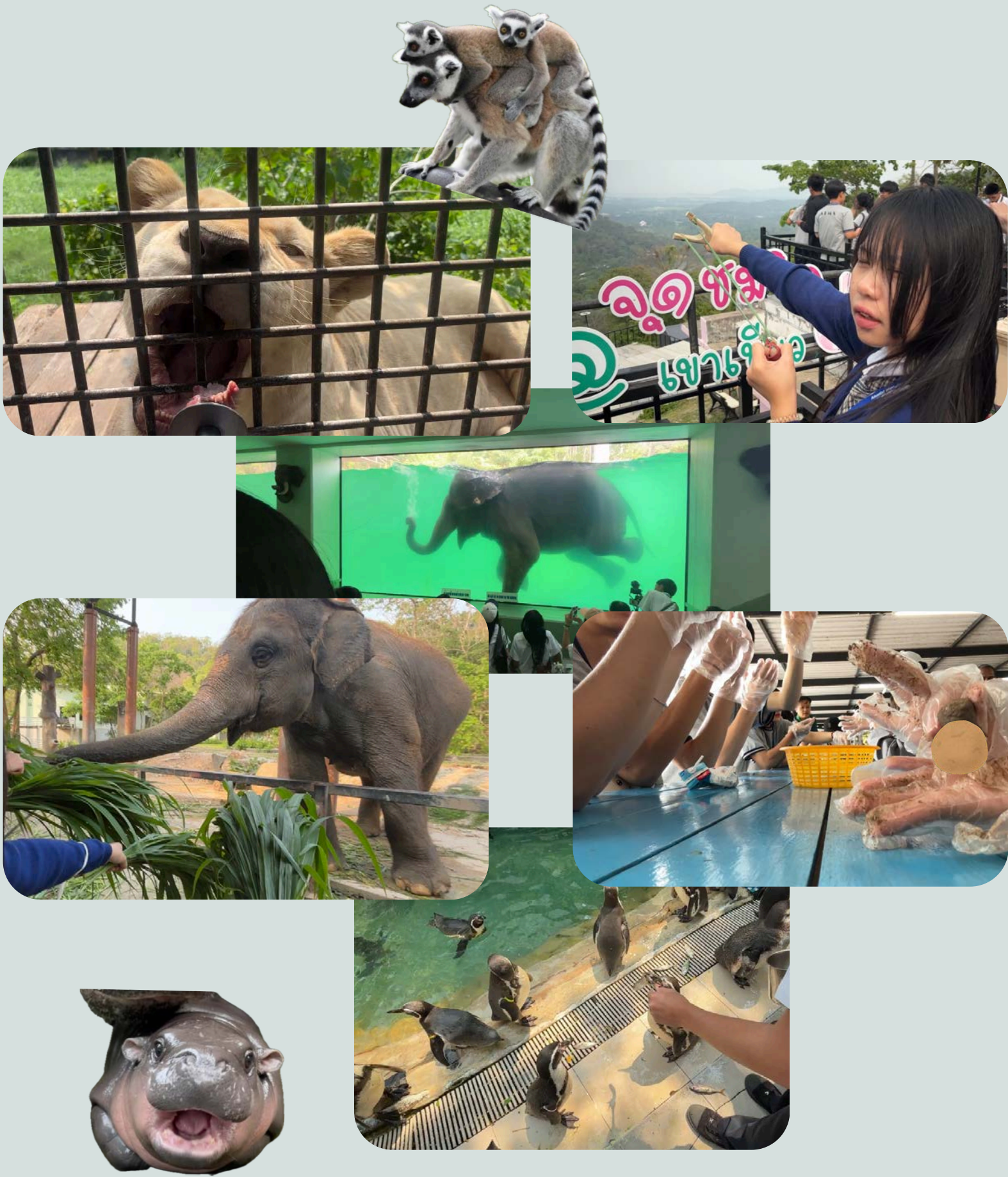

Passing Down Tradition to the Next Generation

Songkran is a traditional Thai holiday during which people splash water on each other, symbolizing the removal of misfortune and welcoming a fresh start. Tr. Marizel, Head of the Kindergarten Department, organizes the Songkran program and its activities.

What kind of activities did you organize for the children?

Tr. Marizel and the Thai Department planned activities such as a short program explaining the significance of Songkran and a water play session, during which children splashed water at each other and at teachers to celebrate Thai culture.

Where did you get these ideas for the Songkran activities?

Tr. Marizel collaborated with the Thai Department, which helped organize the kindergarten program. As the level head, she also contributed additional activities and suggestions in the Songkran celebration.

How did the children respond to the Songkran activities?

Tr. Marizel noted that the children had much fun, chasing and splashing water at each other, sometimes even on their faces. She said, “These were funny moments for them.”

How does participating in Songkran with the children make you feel?

For Tr. Marizel, this event is significant, as Songkran is an important part of Thai culture that has been celebrated for generations. She believes it is important to continue this tradition for the children and to pass it on to future generations.

Is there anything you would change or add to next year’s Songkran celebration?

Tr. Marizel suggested that it would be nice to have more portable pools for the children to play in. She mentioned that this year’s celebration included water sprinklers, which she found delightful, and she hopes to include them in future programs. She also suggested incorporating games related to Songkran traditions.

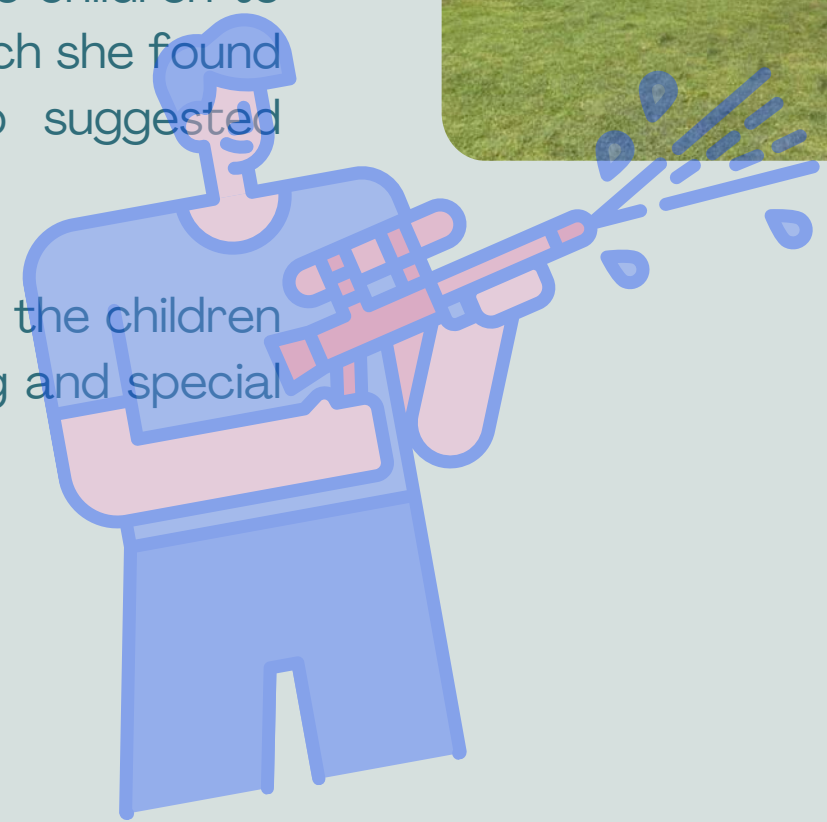
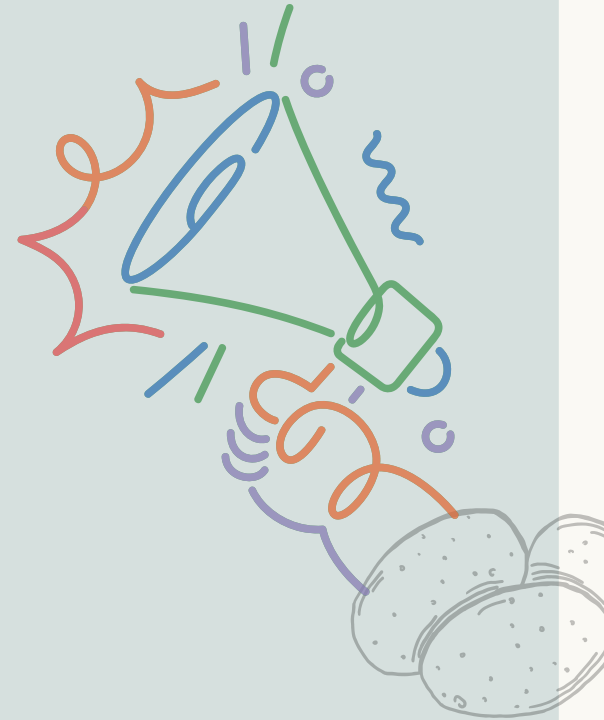

BEYOND COMFORT:

A Songkran to Remember

While most families spent their Songkran holiday enjoying water fights, relaxing at home, or traveling abroad, one family chose a path less traveled—toward the Thai-Myanmar border. Teacher April, along with her husband and two young children, joined a mission trip to Sunshine Orchard and Mu Aye Pu to serve refugee communities. They found not only muddy roads and humble shelters but also deep joy, resilience, and faith. Their journey became a lesson in gratitude, freedom, and what it truly means to give. Here's my interview with her.

How did your family spend the Songkran break?

T. April: Going to the border is not new to me, but for my husband, it was new... when Teacher Tranqui (the organizer) ... asked if we wanted to join the visit to Sunshine Orchard, my husband said yes. So, we decided to go together as a family to the border, in Tak Province.

What was the purpose of the visit?

T. April: The main purpose is to help the schools... Sunshine Orchard Learning Center and Mu Aye Pu School... to build a playground and cement the pathways because when it is rainy, they become muddy... The second one is having the English Camp for those who are interested... We also went there to teach English, especially to the Karen children.



What other activities took place besides teaching English?

T. April: They built the playground and cemented the roads... We also worshipped, sharing God's word with all the children there... The boys and some ladies helped construct the playground and the pathways while most of the ladies, especially those with children, stayed for the English camp, so we divided the group into two.

How did these experiences affect your understanding of the refugees' challenges?

T. April: I saw how simple their lives were there... Even if there was no electricity, no air conditioning, nothing, they were happy... They are happily learning even if it is too hot... They were singing. They were participating; they had no complaints at all.

Are the children there with their families?

T. April: Some of the children don't have families; those who attended the English camp... In Mu Aye Pu... the children don't have parents. They are alone... only the teachers... But in Sunshine Orchard, the children have families in the nearby communities... In Mu Aye Pu, they are really the refugee children.

What did your children say about the experience?

T. April: For Zumie... when I asked her... 'Zumie, can you tell Mommy something about how you feel right now?' She said, 'Mommy, I am more free here. I have freedom.'... 'Because here you are not checking me, but in the village... You are always "Where have you been?"' She also said, 'You know what, Mommy, here, children are not bullies'... 'They don't care if we are loud or running. We are free... The children here are learning a lot. Even without aircon, they are not complaining... In school, if it's too hot, we are already complaining... She also said... 'We get to talk to Jesus more often... during morning and evening worship, and even during the English Camp.'"



What are your reflections on the trip, and what lessons should others learn from it?

T. April: We should be thankful for what we have... An orphan refugee kid approached me and asked, 'Teacher, how does it feel to ride on a bus?'... They don't know what a train is... They also asked me about lions, and other zoo animals... they have never been to the zoo... For us here, we have everything... yet we seem unhappy... We have to be happy and contented for what we have... We should be praying for those children.

What do you hope students learn about community service from this experience?

T. April: Be more engaged in this kind of service... Join more activities such as visiting less fortunate and far-flung communities... Also, simple things, not material things, bring real happiness.

This inspiring interview shows that some of the best lessons in life come from the simplest places. Maybe it's our turn to step out, share a little more, and see how much we can grow too.

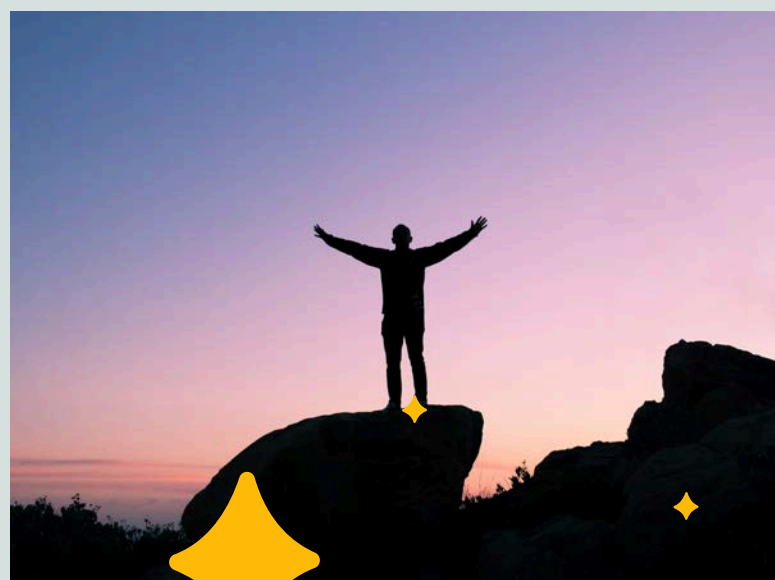
Satang enjoys spending his time with music and literature. He also reads a lot, which helps him relax and grow. But outside of his hobbies, he has also worked hard to achieve success in competitions like Timo and Tbat. These competitions are test-based and focus on topics such as biology and chemistry. Satang takes part in these challenges to prepare for university, hoping they will boost his chances of getting into a good school.

What inspired Satang to work so hard? It all started when he saw a kind and skilled doctor at a hospital. That moment sparked him to help others just like the doctor did. His mother also played a big role, always encouraging and supporting his goals.

One of the most important things is learning how to stay calm under pressure. Because the competitions are timed, Satang had to learn how to manage stress, stay focused, and use his time wisely. NEXT STOP: University

This interview highlights students' voices from our school community as they prepare for life after high school. In this interview, two students from Grade 12 and one from Grade 11 will share their unique goals and aspirations in engineering, medicine, and business. They discuss what inspired their choices, how they're preparing for university, and offer advice for those just beginning to plan their future. Their stories aim to inform and inspire fellow students as they look ahead.

What faculties or what university are you interested in?

Copter: I am interested in the engineering faculty, specifically financial engineering.

Friend: I'm planning to get into medicine. I'm not going international, so I'm staying in Thailand. I'm planning to study here. I would say my top three are Chulalongkorn, Mahidol, and Srinakharinwirot University (SWU). I would like to study in Bangkok because that's where my relatives are.

Idea: I'm interested in business administration in Chulalongkorn University.



Are there any classes that you need to study specifically or any class that help you prepare for university?

Copter: I need to learn a lot of math like calculus because in university I'm going to be using that subject.

Friend: I would say biology or career counseling class. I used a lot of biology because the test to get admitted to a medical school, they require good knowledge in biology. And career counseling gave me time to research about the universities and careers I want to get into.

Idea: English because it prepares me to do a research paper and study in the university.

How do you feel about leaving high school and preparing for university?

Copter: I think it's very scary to go into university because everything will be very different from right now. But then it's also exciting because it's a new chapter of my life.

Friend: It feels strange to me because, I never thought that I would graduate this early. It actually comes at you kind of fast and I heard from a lot of people that college is different. So I have no idea what could be after this, but I think I'm in for a surprise.

Idea: Actually I don't want to go into university yet because I want to enjoy my high school life. It will be more tiring to study in the university, so I have to prepare the mindset change.

What are some requirement you need for your faculties?

Copter: So for my university I had to take IELTS, I had to take SAT, and I needed to write personal statements. Actually they're not required... I thought that it would be good for me to just put them there.

Friend: I would say the two main ones are TBAT and IELTS. TBAT is your core subjects like biology, chemistry, physics and math and IELTS is for your English skills because I'm applying for the first round and that requires a lot of good English... so you need IELTS.

Idea: For going to university, first of all I have to learn all these standardized tests that it need, like IELTS and SAT. And then I have to get the score I want. After that, I just have to prepare for my interview and in some cases we need to have our portfolio.

What are your advise to the younger grades?

Copter: My biggest advice is to to work hard first, like do your best, finish it on your first tries and then you can relax after that.

Friend: My main advice is to start preparing as soon as possible because your time in school goes by fast and before you even know it, you're Grade 12. I'll say maybe even prepare in grade 10 already, I feel like that is a good point to start and take it seriously so you don't have to stress yourself up later on.

Idea: Start fast and you will be fine. If you start fast you can enjoy your life fast. Don't wait for the last minute. An Interview With Assistant Teachers

In every classroom, there's someone who quietly supports both students and teachers every single day, an assistant teacher. To better understand this important role, I interviewed Deyi and Kyalsinshinthant, Grades 4 and 5 assistant teachers at Adventist International Mission School, to hear about their experiences, challenges, and the joy they both find in helping young learners grow.

Inspiration comes from seeing students succeed — especially those who need a little extra support. Helping a shy student speak up, guiding someone through a tough math problem, seeing a student succeed in what they are struggling in, or just offering a smile on a hard day can feel incredibly rewarding

Helping students are possible by having patience, different ways of teaching, and having a good strategy in teaching student due to their different way of learning are one of the best ways to help teach a struggling student. So that they can understand the topic better and not struggle a lot.

The job of an assistant teacher may come with its fair share of challenges — long hours, unexpected situations, and the constant balancing act of meeting the diverse needs of every student. Yet, through it all, assistant teachers carry with them a quiet, steadfast kind of strength. It's not always loud or visible, but it's deeply rooted in something powerful: the unwavering belief that every child deserves to be seen, supported, and encouraged. They understand that behind every student is a world of potential waiting to be nurtured, and they show up day after day, ready to offer a helping hand, a kind word, or simply a steady presence. That belief — that even the smallest act of care can make a lasting difference — is what motivates them. It's what gives them purpose. And it's what continues to inspire them, not just on the good days, but especially on the hard ones, reminding them why their role matters so much in the lives of the children they serve.

New Buildings are Underway

After three years of waiting, AIMS has finally decided to push the plans of renovating old buildings and updating the school's layout. From an interview with the school manager, Khun Weerasak, he explained that the project of demolishing the old cafeteria building will take place during summer vacation and is estimated to be finished within a year. The new building will be bigger and well-equipped with assets for the school's students. It will also feature new classrooms, science lab, English lab, and meeting room. There will also be an improved music room and art room.

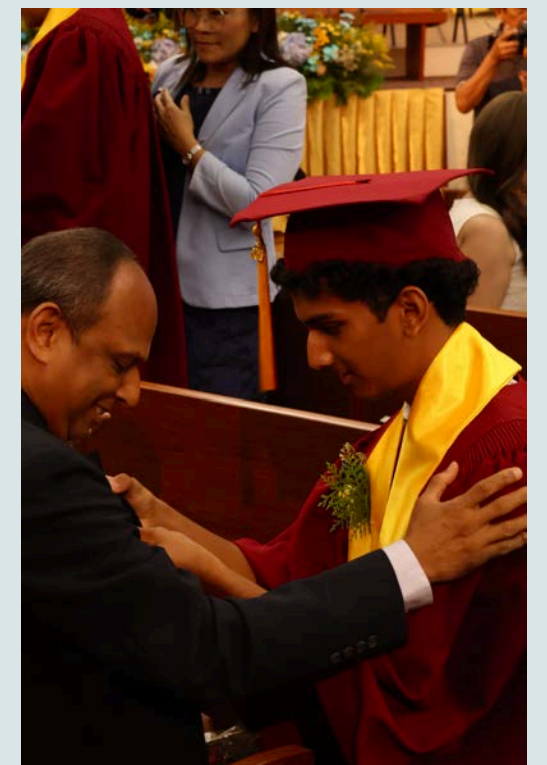


GRADUATION AND MOVING UP

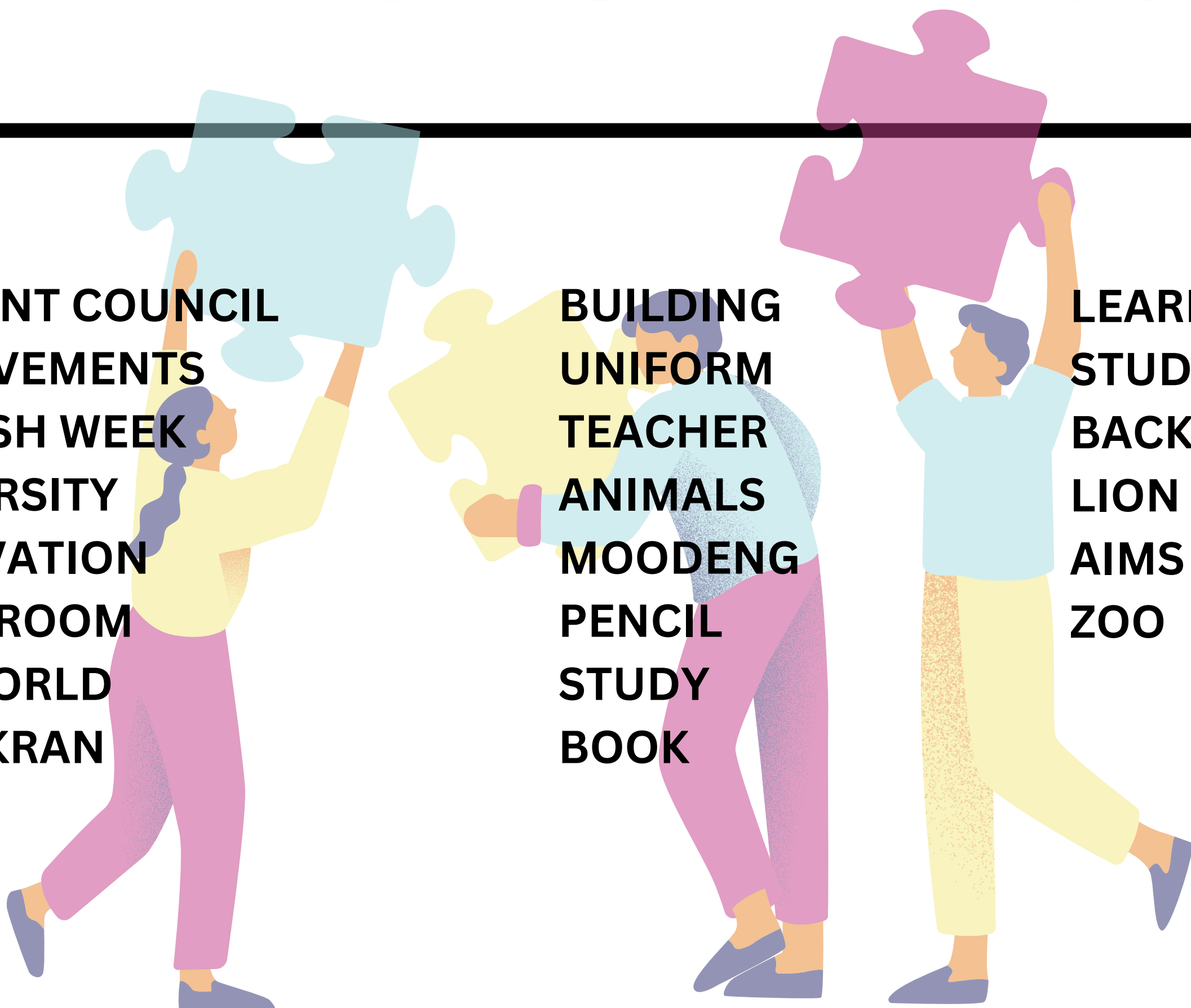

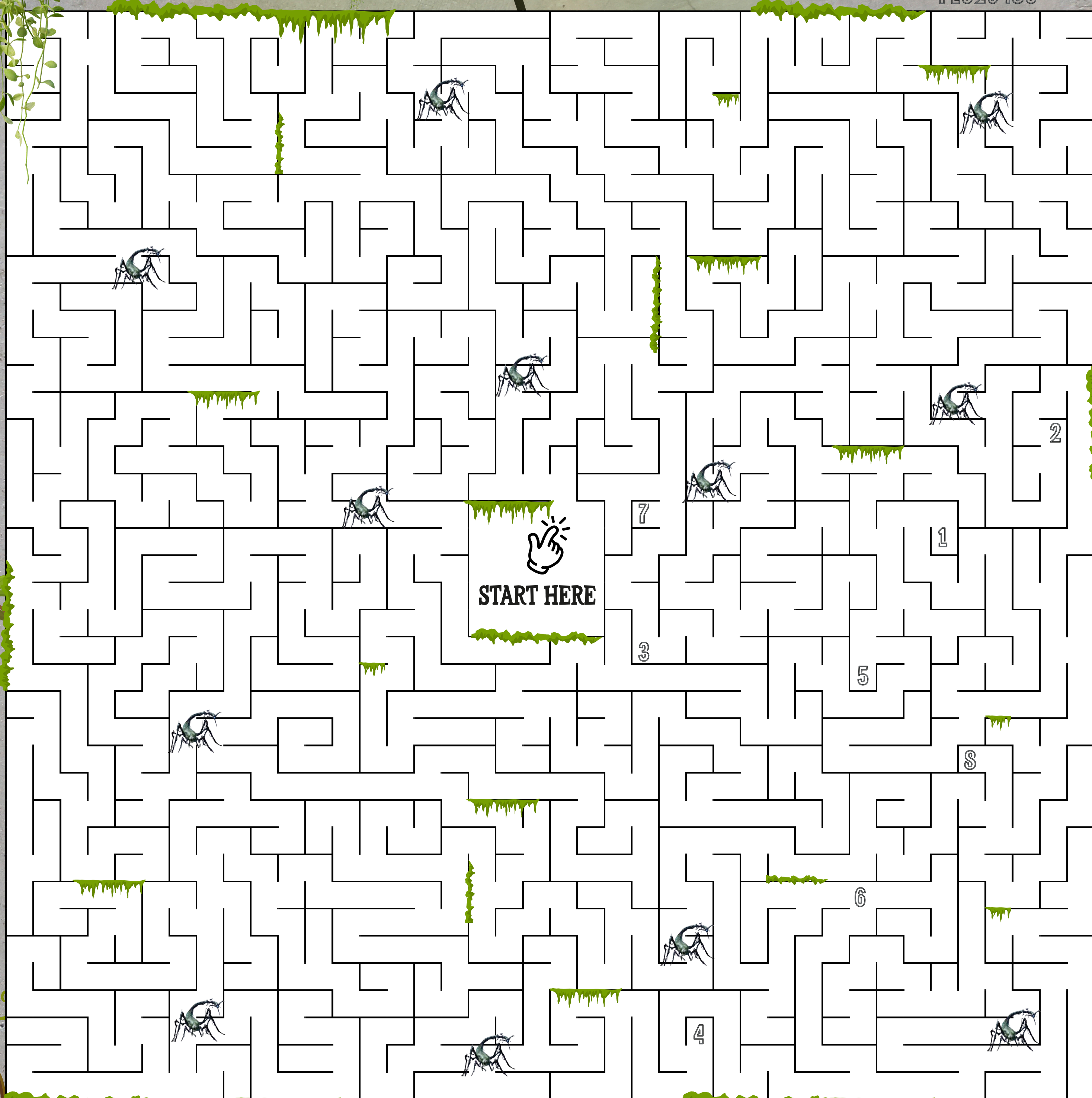
