Kevin Teenakul and Max Tan Zheyuan, Grade 8, won gold medals and cash awards during the National Young Scientist Competition (NYSC), regional level in BITEC in Bangkok. Their entry, the Hydrogen Rocket, was also judged the best project. The two young budding scientists qualified for the national level in Changmai.

Out of 39 groups coming from private and government schools in Central Thailand, Kevin and Max's group earned one of the only two gold medals given during the regional contest.

From the time Kevin and Max were in the sixth grade, they have always enjoyed doing science projects together. Both enjoy reading, especially science books. The partners found making a hydrogen rocket very interesting. For almost four years now, the two have been experimenting, improving, and polishing their project. They first entered their project in the AIMS Science Fair. Teacher Ida, AIMS Science teacher, motivated the two to continue working on the hydrogen rocket project.

Kevin and Max experimented with the hydrogen rocket in an attempt to find alternative fuel for cars and other vehicles. They researched and learned that hy-

drogen is cheaper and cleaner than any other gases that are used today.
