From the Administrator's Desk



Dear Parents,

Homework is a very important part of your child's education here at AIMS.

While there are advocates for and against homework, we feel that this practice is valuable. Since we assign homework we would like to take this opportunity to share some important points of our homework policy.

Homework is an extension of your child's schoolwork. The teacher gives at-home activities that may include:

- Reinforcement of a newly acquired skill
- A preparation assignment to make student ready for a class activity
- A project that is parallel to lessons being learned in the class

The purpose of homework is to help students build good study habits, foster a sense of responsibility, serve as practice for the school curriculum, prepare students for class tests and standardized exams and provide an opportunity for more communication between teachers and parents and student.

Although the time required for the completion of an assignment will vary from student to student, we encourage teachers to be sensitive to the demands of other subjects when planning homework assignments. The following is a guideline for the amount of homework given per day:

Level 1 (prep-center to K3) - no homework

Grade 1 – 20 minutes

Grade 2 – 30 minutes

Grade 3 – 30–45 minutes

Grade 4 – 45 minutes – 60 minutes

Grades 5 to 8 – 90 minutes

Grades 9 to 12 - 120 minutes

We hope the following suggestions taken from Classroom Instruction that Works (Marzano) will help to make homework time worthwhile:

Help your child establish a consistent schedule for completing homework

Help set up a consistent organized place for homework to be done.

Encourage, motivate, and prompt your child, but do not sit with her and do the homework with her. The purpose of the homework is for your child to practice and use what she has learned. If your child is consistently not able to do the homework by herself, please

Grades 7 through 10 use computer tablets for learning

This year, the school did things differently. Instead of using textbooks, it bought Acer Iconia W700 and Acer Aspire 3 computer tablets for the students to use in their studying.

There are advantages in using the tablets at school. First, textbooks are too heavy to carry to school, but the tablets have e-books which makes it easier to carry to school. Second, the tablets are light, and we, students, can do our homework or schoolwork anytime or anywhere. Third, the tablets have many different applications that the students can use in studying like taking down notes, creating presentations, writing essays, doing research, etc. Fourth, there is also a new way for students to submit their work or assignments which is through the Internet. Fifth, both students and teachers have easier access to information. For the students, they can use online resources which help them understand the lessons better. For the teachers, they can prepare lessons easier through online resources. The new website which students are getting used to is



Schoology. Schoology is a website where the teachers can send online homework to students. Students must check their Schoology every day to see if they have some assignments to do.

Sixth, another important thing about using the tablet is we are reducing the use of paper which makes our school ecofriendly. Seventh, "students will also increase in engagement and achievement. They will have improved quality of work and writing skills. They will also improve their productivity and critical thinking skills. They will be able to have better communication and teamwork skills. And lastly, they will develop real-world-skills in using and applying technology." (<http://www.eng.vt.edu/it/tabletbenefits>)

There are also disadvantages in using the new tablets. First, students may get distracted during a teacher's lecture if they go to websites or play computer games instead of listening to the teacher. Second, teachers and students cannot use Schoology if there is no Internet. There is no Internet if there is no power. Third, the students will not be able to use tablets at school if they forgot to charge them at home. Lastly, if a student accidentally drops the tablet, it will break into pieces.

There are many advantages and some disadvantages in using the new tablets. But overall, there are positive things in using this new technology. It's a whole new world for AIMS. ❤
