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From the Administrator's Desk



The 2013-14 school year is fast coming to an end. These were some of the latest happenings at AIMS this school year:

- The kindergarten level has fully implemented the Creative Curriculum which is a theme-based curriculum developed by D. Dodge, L. Colker and C. Heroman.
- A full time business teacher was employed.
- There has been a substantial increase in the science laboratory equipment for advanced science courses.
- Teachers are able to better integrate IT with student learning with the use of tablets and E-books.
- English Speaking and Anti-bullying policies were developed by committees, which included parents, students, teachers and administrators.
- The Thai safety handbook has been translated from Thai into English and adopted for AIMS
- All outdated computers have been replaced in the computer lab and the library resources for the high school have increased by 60%.

Summer school for 2014 continues to evolve to meet the changes occurring because of the development of the learning needs of a high school program.

Please note that the summer school program this year for elementary and middle school (grades 1 - 8) is more intentional. While we have tried in the past to concentrate on core subjects, the program was geared for a kindergarten and elementary school program. This year emphasis will be placed on three major subjects, math, language arts and Thai, from grades 1 – 8. The kindergarten will also emphasize core subjects with emphasis placed on language arts. Assessments will be done regularly and progress reports given to parents. A summer school report card will be given students after the summer school program.

The high school summer school program as set up in 2013 will continue. The summer school courses are intensive. Each course is 125 hours for five weeks and students may only take one course. Students who desire to take a high school course

AIMS celebrates English Week

AIMS celebrated English Week for the first time after several years. The event was held from March 21 to March 28. The theme was Speak English Only. The aim of the celebration was to emphasize that English is important in communicating with people around the world and to encourage speaking English only at AIMS English classes and subjects where English is used, in hallways, Kindergarten building, and library.

The celebration included contests in impromptu speech, poster making, word factory, spelling, quiz, and speech. During the impromptu speech contest, critical thinking questions about the school and student life were drawn at random by contestants from grades 7 through 12. Each contestant was given one minute to prepare for his speech and another two minutes for the speech. In the Junior Level or Grades 6 to 8, Nuttida Sirimongkklanurak or Jan from Grade 7 was the first prize winner, Ha Rim Ji from Grade 8 was second, and Ellie Taylor from Grade 8 was third. In the Senior Level or Grades 9 to 12, Shea

Sundaresan from Grade 10 was first, Anavin Palsingh from Grade 12 was second, and Woo Rim Ji from Grade 10 was third.

The poster making contest had the theme Speak English Only and was divided into three levels: Level 1 (Grades 1-3), Level 2 (Grades 4-6), and Level 3 (Grades 7-9). Grade 1 won the first prize in Level 1, Grade 6 in Level 2, and Grade 7 in Level 3.

The word factory involved Grades 1-3. Students formed words from the group of letters given them. Jam won in Grade 1, Focus in Grade 2, and James in Grade 3.

The spelling contest was divided into four levels: Level 1 (Grades 1-3), Level 2 (Grades 4-6), Level 3 (Grades 7-8), and Level 4 (Grades 9-12). Every contestant spelled well but only four came out as winners. They were Simone Tan Zhehui (Level 1), Nawaporn Itsarasanaruk (Level 2), Nicha Wareewarach (Level 3), and Eldrian Golden (Level 4).

The English quiz categories were authors and books, words denoting sounds, offspring of animals, homes of animals, group terms, specific words for places, one-word substitution, analogies, idioms, antonyms and synonyms, figures of speech, and spotting the error. Plant, Angelish, and Kate won the first prize in Junior Level 1 (Grades 4-6); Chrystal, Eay, and Jas, second, Junior Level 2 (Grades 7-9); and Max, Peace, and Woo Rim, first, Senior Level (Grades 10-12).

The most exciting contest was the speech contest. Two contestants were chosen from Grades 6 through 10. The 10 contestants memorized and rehearsed speeches from famous speakers around the world. Junior Level (Grades 6-7) winners were Phataraporn Suaseenual, first, Jiratchaya Charoenkul, second, Sureeporn Putsom, third, and Mai Sayumpoorujinant, fourth. Senior Level (Grades 8-10) winners were Zyra Lubay, first, Natchaya Intachai, second, and Dave Joshua Mitra, third. The contest was held in the amphitheater of Asia-Pacific International University. Mrs. Ritha Lampadan, Mr. Daron Loo, and Mrs. Shelley Agrey, from Asia-Pacific International University, served as the board of judges.

AIMS students enjoyed watching all the contests in the English Week and supported and cheered for the contestants. Most importantly, they were helped by the English Week to improve their language skills. ♥
