

People have been using devices to communicate with one other for a long time. Devices used for communication have been developed throughout the years, from pigeons to social media.



The use of pigeons started around the time of the Persians. It is believed that Julius Caesar used pigeons as messengers in his conquest of Gaul. It might come as a shock, but these messenger pigeons have both compass and map mechanisms that help them navigate. People took advantage of these birds and trained them to be able to fly far distances.



In 1943, a pigeon named G.I. Joe was awarded a medal of gallantry for helping save the lives of a thousand British soldiers, by calling off the American bombing mission.

The people who used this means of communication, often had to exchange their prized pigeons with the people on the other side. When they feel the need to send an important or urgent message, they attached their messages to the pigeon and let it go and fly.



Advancement in technology in the field of electricity resulted in the invention of the electric telegraph. Some time later, Guglielmo Marconi made a wireless version and received the Nobel Prize for Physics, which he shared with a German physicist Ferdinand Braun.

One of the earlier forms of modern texting is the Bulletin Board System - a computer system that was used in exchanging public messages. Ward Christensen and Randy Suess who wanted to keep up with their computer club without being there invented it in 1978.



The system made it possible for them to join their club meetings from their computers. Messages appeared on the site for everyone to read and reply to. It later developed into a platform called "Six Degrees" in 1997. It was one of the first social networking sites.

Friendster which was founded by Jonathan Abrams, was launched in 2002. It supported multiple languages worldwide.





# NON-VERBAL LANGUAGE

We cannot go one day without communicating. Communication is so important that the world depends on it. Miscommunication can lead to disastrous outcomes in some cases. Many believe that language must be spoken and enunciated to deliver a clear message. However, unspoken messages can bring the same impact, if not better. You may not realize it, we are all communicating non-verbally. It might be intentional or rather it is integrated into our lives for the same purpose verbal language presents.

Paralinguistics is the use of pitch, volume, gestures, etc. Without realizing it, we use it daily to create a clearer message to the people we communicate to. An example of the use of paralinguistics can be waving to a person. You are simply greeting a person non-verbally. Paralinguistics is part of our speech, while presenting an idea, hand gestures and posture can determine how confident you are, or how you are trying to elaborate a situation.

Body language is an important factor in paralinguistics. Body language itself can be broken down into gestures, facial expressions, body movements, touch, and eye contact. Rolling your eyes or sighing can indicate dissatisfaction, disappointment, disagreement, or annoyance.

Sign language is one of the many types of non-verbal communication. Its purpose is to allow deaf and dumb people to communicate naturally. It has given people with disabilities a chance to communicate. In most cases, learning sign language can be used as a tool for simple communication and not only towards a deaf person.



There are a few variations of sign language, the ASL (USA) and BSL (UK) are the most well-known among other variations. ASL includes the movements of one hand and facial expressions while BSL differs with two hand gestures. The importance of sign language can be seen through the success of deaf people. They have shown that they are just as capable compared to the rest of society.



One of the lesser-known types of non-verbal communication is using codes. Morse code and semaphore are the two main types of codes.






Creating videos require precision. All the ideas, location, sounds, lightings, time, and many more will have to be considered. Identifying the people who will take part in the film is essential. Roles will have to be studied to give the best possible portrayal.

There are three main elements in making videos; the Pre-Production, Production, and Post-production. This applies in all categories of filming such as full-length feature films, shorts, animation, and others.

Starting with the pre-production. This is where all the things will be planned on the drawing board. Part of this process is the breaking down of the script and casting of roles. It is advised to prepare a plan B if something does not go according to plan.

Next is the production stage. This is where you capture all of the footages needed in a video. The cast and crew will have to go to different locations that they agreed on during the pre-production stage.

All of the necessary editing is done at this stage, including: trimming, cutting, replacing, adding sounds, effects, etc. These days there are many programs that can be used to edit videos, such as Adobe Premiere, Vimeo, DaVinci Resolve, and many more.

The goal of most filmmakers and content creators is to present their ideas through motion pictures. It is important to know who the target viewers are and what kind of storyline is appropriate for them.

Video making takes time and it needs a lot of planning and preparation, and it all begins with brainstorming of ideas, with a spark of joy and inspiration.

## REPRESENTING VISUALLY

Visual representation is another way for students to learn language and express their ideas. What they may not be able to convey verbally, they can show through their artistic creativity.

It is necessary for everyone to learn and master the basic skills of writing, speaking, listening, and reading, but for those who may need to learn differently, music and arts can be a way for them to also learn language arts. What is important is that, students can sharpen these tools that they will need to succeed later in life.

The oldest language still spoken today is Tamil. Tamil is believed to have originated from the Indian region of Tamil Nadu. It spread worldwide due to the migration of the people somewhere in the 300 BC.

Tamil vocabularies can be seen influencing words in other languages. In English, "pandal" (from pandhal) or pariah (from paraiyar). There are many known Tamil loanwords in English, Malay, Ancient Greek, Russian, Tagalog, and Sinhala.

The oldest variation of Sumerian was mainly pictographic and symbolic. The first ever Sumerian "words" were pictures describing cattle and trade. Sumerian was adapted several times by later civilizations such as the Akkadians and Babylonians.

It supports the assumption that language is heavily influenced by the people's surroundings which can also be seen in Japanese texts. The word "Tree" in Japanese (木) seems to depict a tree, and "Forest" in Japanese (森林) is written with a few more trees.



Linguists have used the sister language connection to find out the general timeline and paths a language took for it to become what it is today. All these branching must at least trace back to the main trunk right? Unfortunately, it is uncertain if whether there was a universal language that all humans spoke before the records of history. It is extremely difficult to make connections and assume the origin of a language without proper records.

Wherever it came from, language is the first skill that a person learns because of how elementary it is. Language has allowed much of human's greatest ideas to be expressed through brilliant inventions and the way we live our lives. Especially with a common language between all borders, our world became connected. With humans being so closely bonded in this age, we will surely see more potential from the human mind.
